

Matt Dietz is a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Air Force currently serving as an Air Force Institute of Technology PhD Fellow at the University of North Texas where he specializes in Modern Air Power, Military Theory and Strategic Thought, and is studying under Dr. Wawro. His dissertation entitled "Hit My Smoke: The History of the US Air Force Airborne Forward Air Controllers" is currently in work to be completed in the summer of 2020.

Lt.- Col. Dietz has logged more than 2,500 flight hours in five different aircraft and has deployed in support of Operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom. Additionally, he has served as a NATO staff officer and planner for Operations Odyssey Dawn and Unified Protector.
