


What Can I Do with a History Degree?

A degree in history opens a world of opportunities and possibilities for your future. According to the most recent data, history majors pursue a variety of professions, and the majority rise to high positions in the careers they choose. History is a dynamic course of study that will help you become an inventive and capable thinker, researcher, writer, and communicator. The history major encourages teamwork and trains students to approach issues from diverse viewpoints on the road to making informed decisions. Historical research requires an apt use of primary sources, secondary sources, and an array of technology, providing history majors with an opportunity to build a skillset that will make them valuable assets to a variety of organizations. It is difficult to imagine a potential employer who would uninterested in this wide range of skills!

College graduates with a degree in history earn median incomes of \$55,000, only marginally less than the \$60,000 earned by business majors and more than the \$51,000 earned by people with life sciences degrees. By the time individuals with history degrees reach the age of 40, most earn salaries equal to or greater than STEM majors. The vast majority of history majors are employed, with less than 4.5% unemployed.

So what do people with degrees in history typically do in their professional lives? The answer is, almost everything! Recent UNT graduates with history degrees work in education, business, law, finance, hospitality, nonprofit, and many additional industries. Degree Requirements

We offer two degrees in the History Department:

- 1. BA in History
- 2. BA in History with Secondary Teacher Certification

BA in History

A BA in history requires completion of 12 hours of required courses and 24 hours of advanced history courses, for a total of 36 hours in history.

Advanced Courses (24 hours):

Students must select advanced courses from the 3000 and 4000 levels. Each student will choose a geographic focus area for advanced course work by taking at least four courses in one of three groups:

- 1) United States
- 2) Europe
- 3) Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East

Students must take at least one course from each of the other two geographic areas outside of their focus.

Each student will also select one of the following themes by taking two courses within that theme:

- Culture and Everyday Life
- Empires and Borderlands
- Food and the Body
- Gender and Sexuality
- Mass Violence and Atrocities
- Politics, Policy and Economics
- Premodern Europe and the Mediterranean
- Race and Ethnicity
- Texas, the South and the West
- War, Military and Society

Students must finish a history course with a grade of C or better for it to count toward the BA in history.

BA in History with Secondary Teacher Certification

A BA in history with secondary teacher certification requires completion of 18 hours of required courses and 21 hours of advanced history courses, for a total of 36 hours in history.

Minor in History

A minor in history requires 18 hours of history coursework.

Required Courses (6 hours):

HIST 2610: United States History to 1865 (or HIST 2675: Honors United States History to 1865) HIST 2620: United States History Since 1865 (or HIST 2685: Honors United States History Since 1865)

An additional 12 hours are required, 6 hours of which must be at the 3000 or 4000 level.

Types of courses

1000 and 2000 level courses

Courses at the 1000 and 2000 level are broad introductory survey courses on US and World history that span multiple centuries. These courses expose students to material that is foundational for continued study in the discipline of history but can also be stand-alone courses for non-history majors.

3000 level courses

Courses at the 3000 level are usually surveys of specific subfields in history that expose students to historical scholarship of a more specific nature than is presented in standard textbooks or lower-level survey courses. In addition to acquiring familiarity with the particular topic of the course, these courses will offer students opportunities to develop competency in the craft of interpreting texts and marshaling evidence in support of writing papers with historical arguments. Generally, expectations and assignments are more rigorous than those in 1000 or 2000 level courses. Essay writing and oral communication skills ideally will develop beyond the introductory level. Courses at the 3000 level appeal to both majors and non-majors.

4000 level courses

Courses at the 4000 level should build upon what has been learned in history courses at the lower levels. These courses provide students with opportunities to delve deeper into more specific historical topics. Courses at this level give students a sense of the professional concerns, methodologies, and standards of historians. The assignments and readings are more demanding than at the 3000 level, with an emphasis on research, higher-level writing, and argumentation skills. Often, students will write papers that develop well-supported historical arguments on the basis of research in primary sources and/or on the interpretation of texts, and most often this will include undertaking a major research or historiographical project. Courses at the 4000 level appeal mostly to history majors and the exceptional non-major.

Honors Thesis

Students in the UNT Honors College have the opportunity to write an Honors Thesis under the supervision of a history department faculty member. The Honors College is dedicated to enriching the undergraduate academic experience for talented, motivated and well-prepared students. Honors College membership is open to all qualified students, whatever their major. Upon joining the Honors College, students find that they are part of an exciting community of talented scholars pursuing academic and intellectual growth. The goal of the Honors College is to help these students build an excellent foundation, via research-based curricula, thereby preparing them to study at the graduate level, establish a career and meet the demands of responsible citizenship.

An Honors thesis is an extended piece of independent student research. Completing a thesis is a multiple-semester process. Students develop thesis proposals in HNRS 3500: Honors Thesis Proposal Development and then finish their theses under the guidance of faculty mentors in their major areas. Students earn 3 Honors credits for thesis work by enrolling in their department's section of HNRS 4951: Honors College Capstone Thesis. Honors faculty members remain available to work with mentors and students as thesis committee members. Students defend their theses in front of their thesis committee and members of the Honors College staff. Students have opportunities to present their research at regional and national conferences and may submit their work for publication in the North Texas Journal of Undergraduate Research or in other scholarly journals.

History Department Awards and Scholarships

The Gil Samples Award for Best Undergraduate Paper in History

Gil Samples is remembered by those who worked with him as an inspiring teacher and a fine historian. This award in his name recognizes two students each year for outstanding writing in a history class for that calendar year. One award is given for a US topic and a second award is given for a non-US topic. The award comes with a \$100 monetary prize and a certificate. Awardees are recognized at the end of each spring semester during the History Department's Graduation and Awards Reception.

Undergraduate scholarships

The Department of History offers several undergraduate scholarships to outstanding students each year. Applications will be posted each September 1st on the department's website. Applications are due by March 1st of each year for the following academic year. The requirements for each scholarship, as well as the additional supplemental materials required (if applicable), are listed below. Awardees are recognized at the end of each spring semester during the History Department's Graduation and Awards Reception.

- **CBS Mechanical History Excellence Scholarship** awarded to a full-time UNT undergraduate student majoring in History, with a minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA.
- **Glynda Steadham Black Memorial Scholarship** awarded to a full-time student majoring in history or pursuing their teaching certification. Preference will be given to those who demonstrate eligibility for need-based financial assistance as determined by completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- **Gus Seligmann History Scholarship** awarded to a full-time UNT undergraduate student majoring in History. Preference is given to pre-law students.
- Hagler-Marquis History Scholarship awarded to a full-time UNT undergraduate student majoring in History. Applicants are required to provide an essay on one or more of the following; (1) activities in which they have been involved that support a culturally diverse population, and/or (2) evidence of socioeconomic hardship they have experienced, and/or (3) personal involvement in life's hardships and successes.
- Harry and Ruth Kamman Scholarship awarded to a full-time UNT undergraduate student majoring in History.
- **History Excellence Scholarship** awarded to a full-time undergraduate student at UNT with a minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA.
- Ledbetter Family Scholarship awarded to a full-time UNT student majoring in History.
- J.L. Kingsbury/Troy M. Thomason History Scholarship awarded to a full-time Freshman or Sophomore at UNT, majoring in History, who intends to teach history in the Texas public school system and who meets the minimum entrance and continuing academic performance standards of the Department. Applicants are required to submit a two-page essay focusing upon their career goals as a teacher in History.
- **Nation's Heritage Scholarship** awarded to a full-time UNT undergraduate student in good standing in the department of History.
- Texas Society Daughters of the American Revolution American History Scholarship awarded to a full- time Junior or Senior at UNT, majoring in American History, with at least a 3.2 overall and departmental GPA. Applicants are required to provide a statement describing their life goals, including some amplification of each goal, and at least one letter of recommendation must be from a UNT History professor.
- The Al Murdock, William T. and Charlotte N. Hagan Scholarship in History awarded to a fulltime*student majoring in history. Must demonstrate eligibility for need-based financial assistance as determined by completion of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- The Gordon Daniel Healey Endowment Fund in History- awarded to a full-time UNT student majoring in History.

Helpful Links

History Help Center

The Department of History operates the History Help Center, which is located in Wooten Hall, room 220. The History Help Center is staffed by students in History and has three functions: to provide tutoring to students currently enrolled in History courses at UNT; to provide a place for taking make-up examinations; and to provide staff for proctoring examinations when instructors are absent during those examinations. The History Help Center is open Monday-Friday 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.

UNT Writing Center

There are 4 locations: Willis Library, Sycamore Library, Discovery Park Library, and Frisco Landing Library. The subject librarian for History is <u>Doug Campbell</u>. The library also offers many <u>Subject Guides</u> that correspond to specific History courses.

The Purdue Online Writing Lab (OWL)

The Purdie Online Writing Lab houses writing resources and instructional material freely available to the public. The online resource assists students in their development as writers at all skill levels.

The Chicago Manual of Style

The *Chicago Manual of Style* is the guide to style, usage, citations, and grammar used by professional historians and students of history.

Kate L. Turabian, A Manual for Writers of Research Papers, Theses, and Dissertations Kate Turabian's manual is a simplified version of the Chicago Manual of Style.

UNT Office of Disability Access

The UNT Office of Disability Access serves as the central campus resource for the University community in regards to students with disabilities and accommodations to remove barriers to access. The ODA works in partnership with faculty and staff to eliminate or minimize barriers in the educational environment and facilitate inclusion on campus by determining reasonable accommodations that will enable every student to have equal access to the full range of UNT programs and services.

UNT Counseling and Testing Services

UNT's Counseling and Testing Services provides comprehensive psychological services to all UNT students. They offer individual therapy, group counseling, crisis counseling, exam testing, and vocational counseling.

UNT Student Health and Wellness Center

They offer treatment for injuries, illnesses, and other medical issues with convenient access to on-site laboratory testing and x-rays. They also offer health education services to keep UNT students healthy, in class, and on the path to graduation and professional success.

UNT Student Legal Services

UNT's Student Legal Services offers a wide variety of legal guidance. The goal of this office is to counsel, advise, and represent UNT students by writing letters, drafting legal documents, representing students, and otherwise attempting to resolve legal problems.

UNT Resource Guide for DACA Students

UNT's DREAMER Resource Guide includes the schedule of necessary steps to complete the enrollment process, required forms, and list of contacts and resources for DACA students across campus.

UNT Survivor Advocate

The UNT Survivor Advocate exists to support students who have been impacted by sexual or relational violence, trauma, or harassment, and connects students to resources, including counseling, health, safety, academics, legal, and more. The UNT Survivor Advocate can assist students with filing protective orders, completing crime victim's compensation applications, contacting professors for incident-related absences, working with housing to facilitate a room change (if needed), and connecting students to the many other resources that are available, both on and off campus.

UNT Food Pantry

The UNT Food Pantry, presented by Kroger, works to address food insecurity among students.
